Thank you to the community members that attended or submitted their proxy for the Annual Meeting in October. We were able to hold the Annual meeting only due to your commitment to our Community.

Two guest speakers were in attendance of our Annual Meeting. Ms. Delores R. Oates, our County Representative and Dr. Edward C. Daley, Warren County Administrator. Several residents raised the concern over the \$200 Fire Department fee that each homeowner pays annually. Ms. Oates and Dr. Daley were moved by the passion displayed about the issue. The morning following the Annual Meeting Dr. Daley asked the Association to petition the County Board of Supervisors requesting the repeal of the proffer that establishes the fee. Our petition was received that afternoon. We will notify residents when this is on the County Board Agenda when they will be voting on this issue.

At the annual meeting, H.J. Dingess and M.W. Robinson were nominated to serve on the Board of Directors for three year terms. We look forward to the contributions from both H.J. and M.W. over the next few years. A special thank you to outgoing members, Tom and Kara that served their terms well. Thank you to Tom for serving the residents of the townhome community honorably.

The December's Board meeting will be held Tuesday, December 6th at 6:00 p.m. at the No. Warren County Fire and Rescue Station #10 on Rockland Road. The business meeting should start by 6:30pm. Our new landscaping company, HLS will address the Board and the community. HLS offers additional landscaping services for each section of the community, see pricing breakdown on page 3. Details regarding the upcoming meeting will be sent out soon.

This winter season snow removal will be preformed by three different organizations. The townhouses will be cleared by HLS, clearing the parking lot but not the sidewalks. Shadows Drive, Ace, Birdie, Caddie, and Divot Courts will be cleared by VDOT. South John Hopkins and side streets and North John Hopkins and side street will be cleared by DR Horton's contractor. We understand this is the same contractor as last year and their salt spreader is working and we should not see a guy in the bed of a truck hand tossing salt. (Hopefully!) The only area that the snow removal contractor controlled by the Board would be in the townhouse section.

If you normally park on the street, please move your vehicle/s to your driveway during a snowstorm. If the plow cannot pass your vehicle(s), the plow will not be able to clear your street.

A special thanks to board member Stephen Horvath for his work on bidding out the new landscaping contract and coming up with improvements to the entrance. The Christmas wreaths were Sheila Asbury's special touch. Thank you both.

Two seats on the HOA board were vacated this year by the outgoing Secretary Kara Antonio and Treasurer Tom Galloway. The Board thanked these members for their service to the Board and to the Community.

As two open seats needed to be filled a call for nominations was made and two nominations came to the floor. M.W. Robinson and H.J. NEW ASSESSMENT RATES FOR 2023

The 2023 HOA Assessments has been approved by the passing of the 2023 Budget. In November, notices were sent out to the community regarding a change in the 2023 General Assessment and Service Fees for residents of Blue Ridge Shadows. Assessments are due on the 1st of the month and are considered late if not paid by the 15th. There is a \$25 late fee assessed on the 16th of the month. Effective January 1, 2023, the monthly assessment will change, as follows:

- General Assessment -- \$27.28 per home
- Townhomes -- \$111.59
- Single Family -- \$51.90
- Highlands (55+) -- \$162.31

The General Assessment per home per month plus an additional service fee based on the home type, as follows:

Townhouse - \$111.59 + \$27.28 = \$138.87 Single Family - \$51.90 + \$27.28 = \$79.18 Highlands (55+) - \$162.31 + \$27.28 = \$189.59

Coupon booklets will be sent out. Assessments are due on the 1st of each month regardless if you have received your coupon book, payments can be made on-line using the new ComWeb Portal https://comwebportal.com/. LANDSCAPE UPDATE

The BRS HOA Board signed a landscaping and snow removal contract with HLS.

The services by HLS will commence in January 1, 2023. A Cut Above provided their last services for the season including new plantings of the island on Shadows Drive near the entrance of the community.

- Basic Maintenance Package: \$1,040.00
 Mowing, weeding, edging, pruning, and mulch application on standard house types (large mulch beds will be assessed on an individual basis).
- Fertilization of Lawn: \$45.00 per application -- Up to 5 applications of fertilizer and weed control
- Aeration and Overseeding: \$250.00
 Aerate and overseed all lawn areas.

Highlands Addt'l Services Pricing**

- Additional Services (Fenced in Areas)
 Maintenance Package: \$240.00 -- Mowing,
 weeding, edging, pruning, and mulch
 application (any additional large mulch beds
 will be assessed on an individual basis).
- Fertilization (Fenced in Yard): \$10.00 per application -- Up to 5 applications of fertilizer and weed control.
- Aeration and Overseeding (Fenced in Yard): \$75.00 -- Aerate and overseed all fenced in lawn areas.

Keep Your Engines Spring-Ready

Before storing your small lawn and garden fuelpowered machines away for the winter, make sure there's no fuel left in the carburetor. Fuel left in the carburetor over winter evaporates over time, leaving residue that clogs the tiny internal passageways and jets, preventing proper fuel induction and air ventilation. It is the No. 1 cause of hard-starts or nostarts in the spring.

Rototillers, small mowers, log splitters, string trimmers, chipper/shredders and other machines that have fuel tanks directly over the carburetor will leak fuel all winter long if not properly drained. Here are a few helpful tips:

If the tank is almost empty, allow engine to run until it shuts off by itself. If the tank has more than an inch of fuel, drain or syphon to empty. (Be careful not to tip the carburetor-side toward the floor as it might cause it to fill with motor oil.) Start engine, and let it run until it shuts down. For machines with fuel shut-off valves, turn to the "off" position. Then, start the engine, and let it run until it shuts down. Your equipment is now ready for its long winter's nap.

Preparing for the winter months

Protect your A/C Compressor

Even though the condenser unit is built for outdoor elements, it can still be damaged by falling icicles and other debris. Many manufacturers recommend against a compressor cover as it creates a warm space for critters and causes condensation, which can lead to early corrosion and mold. Consider instead applying a piece of plywood on top of the unit to protect the fan from damage caused by falling icicles. See your maintenance guide to learn how to clean your air conditioners in the Spring.

Furnace Inspection

Keep your furnace running efficiently by having it professionally maintained and inspected. Inefficiency can cost you money as your furnace has to work harder in the winter months. Change furnace air filters regularly at least every 3 months to keep fresh air flowing through your air ducts, maybe more often if there are smokers in the house or pets.

Ceiling Fans

In the summer ceiling fans turn counterclockwise to create a downdraft, and in the winter, set the ceiling fan direction to spin *clockwise* to pull the heated air up and around the room to spread the warm air across the room more efficiently. The fan can be set at slow or medium speeds to be effective at moving the heated air around the room.

Clean and Inspect your Chimney

Hire a chimney sweep to professionally inspect and clean your flue, fireplace or wood stove before use. This step can prevent chimney fires, which account for over 20,000 residential fires each year. Birds and squirrels love to nest in chimneys, so make sure it's clear. A blocked chimney or flue can also increase your chances of carbon monoxide poisoning. Install a detector that can detect odorless, deadly gas in the home.

Essential Winter Safe Driving Tips

Roads that are slippery with ice and snow can be difficult for even the most experienced driver. Before you head out, know that you can take precautions to help ensure that you arrive at your destination safely.

Slippery roads reduce the amount of traction your tires have and these conditions make your vehicle harder to control. Slow down to give yourself plenty of time to react to hazards.




Increase Your Following Distance

Allow plenty of space between your car and other vehicles. It takes four to ten times more distance to stop on ice and snow than on dry pavement.



Know the Roads

Ice forms more quickly on bridges, overpasses, intersections and hills. By knowing and identifying these potentially slippery areas, you can reduce your speed accordingly when approaching them.



Leave Early

Allow plenty of time to get to your destination safely so that you don't feel the need to rush or speed.



Be Prepared for Anything

Pack essential emergency items in your vehicle and make sure you have someone to contact if you need help.



Buckle Up

Seat belts continue to be proven as the #1 life-saving device in crashes.





Animal Winter Safety Tips





All animals react differently to the cold, even if they are considered to be "cold-weather" animals. Age, health, regular exposure to the cold and more can affect how your animal may experience health consequences in colder temperatures. Consult your veterinarian for more information on how to care for your own pet's health this winter. At 45°F, young, elderly and/or sick animals can begin to suffer health consequences.

Provide Shelter

At 32°F or less, no owned dog or cat should be left outdoors unless they have access to a well-insulated structure that



- Is large enough to curl up in and has a wind block at the door
- Includes a heated water bowl so they have access to an unfrozen water
- Has a floor, is elevated from the ground, has warm dry blankets or dry straw and has heating or an outdoor heating pad



Feral Cats

Feral cats have likely found warm places to hide, but if you are worried about a local feral cat, you could consider putting out a weather-safe container with bedding and a hole for entry. You also want to provide water, but you need to be vigilant to make sure it does not freeze.




Warning Signs

Signs that an animal may be getting too cold include:

- Trembling
- Sleepiness
- Slowed breathing
- Mobility issues
- Dry skin
- * Numbness
- * Illness

(these last two are the most serious)

Walking Your Dog





- Check with your vet whether your pet may want additional clothing beyond their "fur coat" in this chilly weather.
- Watch for any signs of injury or extreme cold to their paws, especially in the snow or ice. Wipe off paw pads on your way inside to prevent chemical melting agents from injuring paws or being ingested.



Pet Care Kit

Be prepared for loss of heat and/or power outages to your home. Prepare a pet care kit so you have what you need for your pet if you need to leave in a hurry.



Make Some Noise

Don't forget about our wild neighbors who may use your vehicle as a wind block in these chilly temperatures. Make plenty of noise and give them time to make their exit before driving away!

Spotted Lanternfly Update What they've Left Behind.

The invasive Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) were here over the summer. This fall the females laid their eggs. While most adult spotted lanternflies have frozen to death, their eggs can survive over winter and are viable from about October through July. Adults lay their eggs in masses in the late fall on trees, under bark, posts, lawn furniture, cars, trailers, outdoor grills, and on many other surfaces. Use the winter months to walk around your property to look for egg masses.

If you find egg masses any time through April, scrape them off using a plastic card or putty knife and place into a bag or container filled with rubbing alcohol or hand sanitizer. This is the most effective way to kill the eggs, but you also can smash or burn them. It's important to eliminate as many egg masses as possible. A single egg mass could hold 30 to 50 eggs.

Please be safe while scraping. Don't climb ladders to scrape hard to reach egg masses.
