Parking rules. A Resolution regarding Estate sales has been approved by the Board and a copy has been mailed to each homeowner. The Resolution was created to address the problem of excess traffic and parking generated on the side streets in our community due to an Estate Sale event.

MANAGEMENT REPORT – Jorie Martin

Financials: Expenses YTD are over budget because the landscape contract payment for March was paid in the February cycle. The association is on budget for the contract. Water/sewer is on budget with no variance at all for the water usage – Management recommends that the line item for water and sewer be increased in the 2020 budget year. The transfer of the excess operating cash and the full funding of the snow line item will be reflected in the March statement.

Resolution: Management produced a draft resolution for Estate Sales. The Resolution includes a deposit that would be refunded if no violations occur during the sale.

Proxy and Notice: Attached to the management report is the draft proxy and notice for the 2019 Annual meeting scheduled for May 14th 2019. The notice will be sent out on April 1st 2019.

Landscaping: Advantage was invited to attend the meeting on Wednesday for the first 15 minutes if the board agrees. Tyler would like to introduce the crew chiefs for Woodbrook and discuss the contract including the fertilization/ pre- emergent scheduled for this week and the start of the spring clean- up and mulching.
